Community Conversations

In-person community conversations took place on February 14, 15 and 16 in Beaverlodge, Hythe and Horse Lake First Nation. At each event, project team members shared the three scenarios for junior high programming under consideration and asked attendees to share the benefits, drawbacks and considerations for each scenario. Participants were encouraged to share their ideas for other ways to maximize benefits and address drawbacks and to ask questions for compilation and response.

All best practices stopped this and they moved away from it. It would caution people willingly exposing their very young impressionable people to this extremely stressful situation

I feel bringing the communities together is so beneficial to the students. So many friends are made and continue the rest of their lives. We need all the kids together for funding and programs. When something is working so WELL, why change it. I don't want grades 8 and 9 to mix early with the High School, too much immaturity. A high school teacher told me its because of the elementary, junior high and high school is why so many kids go on to higher education. we have a very high rate in Beaverlodge of kids going on, thats because of the Elementary and Junior High Schools. Everything is working so well, LEAVE IT ALONE. We live in a rural community so BUSSing isn't a ISSUE. Go live in GP if you dont want to ride a bus, Oh, even there they have TOO.

I don't want the see the funding split. I love the diversity of children at the current HRS.

This would split our childrens options for school sports potentially detering kids from playing sports and learning to love being active.

Sad to see another attempt to separate the communities

If BES takes on their own 7-9, HRS wont be able to continue the level of education for their 7-9 Also, the kids like it best when new students are introduced into HRS at Grades 7-9

Gr 8's and 9's are not ready for high school. This could be detrimental to their mental health. They will be exposed to things they shouldn't be exposed to. Grade 7's would be elementary students again and by Grade 7, they need to change/transition out of elementary. Friendships will not be fostered with other communities. Students won't be exposed to communities, students won't be exposed to diversity which teaches them many things.

HRS enrollment level will drop, possibly affecting the feasibility of the school. HRS students may have to be bussed to Beaverlodge

Too young (Grade 7-9) to be introduced to an open campus High School

BES will likely lose newer families to St Mary's going forward - it is unfortunate for the school to be losing families due to St Mary's policies but to turn around and hurt another school and jr high programming in the area generally is not the solution

Keep the students in our community, less time on the bus, less transitions for kids with special needs, able to enjoy and partake in community events. Better mentorship between older/younger kids, fill our current school in our own community.

Kids can stay closer to home so it becomes easier to become involved with the school/sports/students. It's a scary exchange to start taking a separate bus to a middle school when you're barely 13. The whole school process should be available PUBLICLY for all years of school. Also less time riding busses, more time learning/interacting or getting very needed breaks!! Kids should have schooling in their own community from all K-12.

This would benefit me as a single working mom to be able to accommodate the needs of my child. I want to keep her in public education if this is not possible, I will have to switch to Catholic. My child benefits greatly from this scenario as she will have continually be in her home community, have access to more ammenities, be closer to a hospital & police department, be involved in community events. She will also not be on a bus unnecessarily being bussed on a busy highway put her life at unnecessary rish.

The 1-6 grades get more interaction with older kids in an athletic and social setting.

Grade 9 children enter a semester setting younger making th schedule easier by grade 10

Sports teams will have more players on teams and have an extra year of development making college/university teams more attainable.

This scenario gives me great comfort as a mother, auntie to a 14 year old & 17 year old. We went through the current situation and found that there was a huge disconnect having my children in another community. If my children were educated in their home community where we reside, I would be more involved parent at school. My children are in all school sports and I spend way to much time on the highway and riding the bus risking their lives. Time for change

Safety for our kids, the travel is such a waste of everyone's time. Its 4 more hours my children are on the highway. If we wanted our kids to go to school in Hythe, we would move to Hythe. We have hospital and police beside our schools for added safety in case of emergencies. Older and younger siblings will be with each other at school. Parents don't have to travel to pick up kids for sports or drop them off. Change already!

Our kids stay in their community which allows them the availability to go home when sick, hungry, an accident or forgot something important. Gives them an hour or more a day back that they are losing on the Bus! Potentially, saves their lives as they aren't on the 10,000+ vehicle highway a day! Also, the closeness to a hospital. THIS MATTERS!

Retaining our student body. Peace Wapiti can not ignore this problem any more. We are losing kids to St. Mary's. New families are choosing St. Mary's. My daughter is in grade 6. Since K, she has lost 6 friends to St. Mary's (which = 6 families). My son in K now only has 32 kids in total. Beaverlodge is not a dying community. It is thriving. Our public school should be too.!

My family is very involved with Beaverlodge with owning businesses & volunteering in a variety of organizations. The benefit of my kids staying in Beaverlodge would be huge - security, involvement, foster leadership in town events if opportunities were given. I want t osee them walking around town at lunch! Feeling happy, confident & secure in their familiar environment. Not going to a "closed campus" neighbouring town in a K-9 school.

Kids will still meet kids from Hythe - hockey is very competitive between the communities and it is fine.

Kids don't have to bus (the highway is busier than it used to be)

Kids aren't being moved from one elementary school to another (when it was separate junior high, it was different)

Scenario 2: What are the drawbacks of this?

Research suggests adults who engage children in a culturally responsive education experiences help to: Build young childrens self confidence & skills,

Increase children's awareness, appreciation & inclusion of diverse beliefs & cultures, maximize children's academic achievement and educational success

We are trading low enrollemnt at one school (BES) for low enrollment at another school (HRS)

Kids who are bulled by their peers from BES JK-Grade 6 will not receive fresh starts. They may be desparate for in grade 7 at HRS.

Segrating Hythe & Horselake students is a step backward in truth & reconciliation

This creates conflict, divide and disconnect between two communities that could work together & compliment each other

We are putting off the students joining together at a younger age when they really could use a fresh start with new school, new teachers, new friends, new experiences

Loss of so many programs & options & resources for both schools

All drawbacks for Scenario B & Scenario C are the same

Too many split classes will occur at both schools

Specialized teachers will be teaching all subjects = lack of quality education

Bringing all 3 communities together provides friendships that are desparately needed by students from all of the communities. Taking that away would be detrimental to many students

Peers who remain in the same community for too long with the same kids/teachers are not challenged. They have false sense of security

The later the interaction between kids of differet communties, the harder it is socially. (Awkward ages for Kids)

Splitting the total Jr high funding for the area will result in 2 junior highs of smaller size and neither able to offer a full slate of programs, teachers, etc.

Less social diversity exposure

Moving to a new school for Grade 7 can be a fresh start for many students after 7 years in one school.

Jump from your elementary school straight to high school would be too much

Playing "hot Potato"= someone's going to end up with low enrollement, BL is wanting to pass it off to Hythe (from a BL parent)

The kids need to be aligned at the grade 7 level, not grade 10. More accepting at a younger age. Friends are made at a younger age.

Less funding for Hythe school.

Safety concern at BL

Old school, Lead paint, asbestos, no sprinkler system, have to get water from across the street in an emergency Why put more kids in an old school?

The communities need to work as one under PW not split and cause conflict

Extra curricular activites. . How would that work? Grade 9's compete with High School . . Those are big ability gaps.

Grade 8's won't be able to form their own community being with such an age gap of kids.

Hythe offers own space to help develop new independence.

Beaverlodge gym too small to accomodate Jr High sports

Long run . . Beaverlodge will need a new school which is costly. Very one sided approach . Welcome to the GREAT DIVIDE

Loss of great teachers & Programming in a school that is functioning quite well

This creates conflict between communities

Kids remaining in the space area/same teachers/ same peers is not exposure enough to prepare for high school No fresh starts for kids who may need one.

Segration of communities will greatly affect the mental health of students.

Is it really expected that if any change takes place - that the Hythe & Horselake parents will still be affected by almost every point Beaverlodge is highlighting to try and force change/

HRS is designed to give the kids a little bit of independence after elementary. A small stepping stone before High school transition. Keeping them at BES until grade 8 will loss that stepping stone

Life long friendships are fostered in Jr High. Dividing the communities will end this!

Grade 9' are not mature enough for High School.

Grade 7 & 8's at BES will suffer being in an elementary. At HRS, the 7-9 and K-6 are 2 separate schools under the same roof

Lose bus funding

Neithr BES or HRS will be able to offer all the special programming, the extra cirrcular, specialized teachers, options BES is NOT set up for Junior High Students

No Diversity at BES, students NEED to be informed,& introduced to new cultures.

Significant cost to get BES up to a poiint where they can accommodate more grades

Loss of social connections between youth in the region

Loss of funding to PWSD for bussing

Small classes - small Jr High #= reduced funding

Will result in fewer options for the kids & lower quality education

HRS, BES, BRHS will all possibly loose speciality teachers to the larger schools in Grande Prairie or beyond!

I am very disappointed that the board let the situation get to this point. The old rivalry's have been enflamed & discension is at an all time high. We are 12 minutes apart & like it or not, we are one big community

BES has NO room for growth (small bathrooms, no kitchen, no parking)

HRS is fully funcitonal as a junior high already and has extra space.

It is 2023. Why are we trying to segregate kids into separate schools that will not be able to offer the programming HRS provides? Also why won't Beaverlodge talk about their unlying reason? RACISM

It will be many years before BL is approved for a new school

BES and BLRH have small parking lots. Parking could become an issue. BES has a small gym. How will they accommodate K-8 PE programming?

Bus Drivers will loose bus routes. Loosing wages!

"If" parents are leaving BES for any reason other than bussing, how will PW address & rectify these issues, adding years to a child's stay will not fix anything

Kids need to interact & be aware of other cultures, need those friendships that are created with meeting kids from other communities. HRS currently meets these needs. Great Teachers

Mentally, it's a lot for junior high kids to adapt when their peers have been there for a year already

Kids from Hythe going into BRHS in grade 10 will be at a disadvantage to Beaverlodge kids who were there in Grade 9 socially

Losing transportation grant for Hythe

This schoold was designed for K-9 students! Why waste money on infrastructure when we can utilize what is here! Use that money for kids and programming.

None - I attended Sexsmith and it was a 9-12. Worked well way back then

Concerns with semesters for Grade 9 at BRHS - Students need time to practice skills learned. Jr High cirriculum not designed for semesters.

Please listen

50 years LATE. Too long on bus

None for BES

Bulled for all of Elementary. Time for a change.

Concern for Grade 9's to mix with grade 10-12's because of maturity level, social aspects and open campus (BRHS has) HRS is closed campus

Splitting total Jr high student funding between 2 schools will result in neither school with enough funding to offer a full slate of programs and services

NONE - Time for change

Low utilization of a building designed for Junior High @ HRS. Crowding at BES & BRHS.

Loss of cultural diversity if students don't go to Hythe.

No drawbacks for BES students

K & E programming will not be offered as a stand alone, just included in mainstream classes.

Separating communities is harmful to all students and staff involved. It is a necessisty to keep the cultures together. Aslo with the loss of funding, what programs get cut? Which teachers lose their jobs?

The staffing ration for K-6 students will not increase with the addition of 7 & 8. With 4 Jr High classes added, there is in fact the distinct possibility of a 6/7 and 7/8 split grades. BES

BES has extra classrooms which are not being used for home rooms. At least three of these are now being used for specialty rooms such as fine arts, arts, and special Education. These rooms would be need for Junior High home rooms so special facilities will be reduced. BES

BES is currently a Compressed School Week facility, meaning that they get 9 Fridays off each year to make up for extended hours. This would no longer be the case as their day would be shortened.

Gym facilities likely double booked for classes. BES

Washrooms, playgrounds will be more congested with a broader age range of students. BES

Beaverlodge Grade 9 students put onto the semester system. More intense learning placed upon them in the shorter period of time. BRHS

High school teachers covering any Grade 9 classes would have to continue to teach during exam weeks or schedules during those times would be severely affected. BRHS

Grade 8 shop times would be affected as 2 separate schools would be sending students as classes. BRHS

Provincial Achievement tests will be administered at BRHS On the semester students. This means that PATS will be administered twice yearly for BL students with likely increased stress on students and parents. BRHS

Grade 9 students will be exposed to a high school culture early. While some of this may be positive, there will also be influence get involved with high school aged social activities like drinking, smoking, drugs etc. Junior high students at HRS are presently supervised at all times. At Present, HRS is a closed campus. Students are required to remain at the school during lunch breaks. BRHS would have to monitor Grade 9 students or include them in the lunch break open policy. BRHS

Utilization drops to under 50% in spite of student numbers remaining consistent for previous years. This low utilization could lead to loss of all junior high students. HYTHE

Staffing reduction, teachers, and support staff terminated or transferred.

Too few students to field competitive sports teams HYTHE

Loss of special events and programs due to reduced per student funding. HYTHE

General staffing would continue to be on a per student ratio. This would mean that the staff presently supported at HRS would be redistributed among 3 schools with the availability of specialized teachers and support staff for those students substantially reduced. Flexibilty for teaching assignments would also be lower. 7-9 STUDENTS

Funding for special cultural, social and other programs would be split with resulting decreases for Junior High specific events including dances. 7-9 STUDENTS

Athletics would be greatly impacted. Intramural and inter school programs would lose the depth allowed for under the present system. The population to draw teams from would be much smaller in all three schools. Teams would be less competitive and A and B teams would likely not be possible. BRHS charges for athletic extracirricular programs so any grade 9 students who wish to play will do so at a cost. Grade 9 students would also be much less likely to be able to make the competitive intraschool teams.7-9 STUDENTs

Socialization between young people from the various communities in the West County would be delayed. Beaverlodge elementary students would remain with the same cohort until Grade 9, Hythe and Horse Lake students until Grade 10. Many friendships that have traditionally developed in jr High would not materialize. The sense of united community within our rural setting would be reduced. 7-9 STUDENTS

Truth and Reconciliaiton - HRS in partnership with Horse Lake and Western Cree Council presents frequent special events to foster the spirit of Truth and Reconciliation. This would be reduced for HRS students and essentially eliminated for Beaverlodge area students to the detriment of all of us. 7-9 STUDENTS

Increased costs of transportation. BES would need new resources, equipment, desks, supplies to accommodate the higher grade levels. BRHS would require Grade 9 resources. PWSD

Loss of provincial transportation grants for bussing students to HRS. The grant presently is about \$137,000 PWSD

Laying off or reducing hours for bus drivers currently on the BL-Hythe run twice daily PWSD

Increased short term costs to administer the transition to the status quo. PWSD

Once BRHS has been established as a regional 9-12 school, there would probably be long term pressure to make all West County schools in K-8 schools, drawing Grade 9 students from Hythe, Valhalla, Elmworth and possibly Wembley into Beaverlodge. This would affect all of those schools, even to the point of making some of them no longer viable as K-8, or even K-6. PWSD

A major item on the BES proposal is the purported danger of bussing students to HYTHE on Hiway 43. Peace Wapiti has an impecable busing safety record. The last bus incident on that road was 20 years ago involving a bus and a Hythe High School who was NOT using the busing system, lost control and collided with that bus. In fact, the overall number of serious accidents on that section of highway has dropped in recent years. Beaverlodge parents routinely drive their children to activities in Grande Prairie and beyone on roads with much worse records.

Gave 7's and 8's in a building that was built for elementary students. The money that would need to be spent would be outrageous. There are no outside acitivities for Jr High students. There isn't even space for them outside. Gym is way to small for Jr High students. No room to have 7-8 separate from K-6. &-8's wont get a fresh start with new teachers and new friends. Grade 9's are not ready for high school.

Fewer students - less programs and speciality teachers; more probability of split classes. BES will lose programs when space is filled

School teams will be weak or non existent.

Less for all, we need to stay together.

the risk of riding the bus now is shared all west county between Hythe & Beaverlodge communities. Kids have to ride a transfer bus for 3 years.

All over Alberta there has been a constant erosion of local services to rural communities and small towns as medical, social service, legal and educational services become more centralized in larger centers. This trend can only be

limited if smaller communities work together to save those services. The most effective way to do this is by eliminating the competition between smaller communities and considering a true regional strategy that works towards the good of all citizens involved. The necessitates abandoning historical rivalries, many of which have been around for decades.

Over 40 years ago the citizens of both Hythe and Beaverlodge realized that there were not enough students in each community to offer high quality education at the grade 7-12 levels. In the spirit of providing what was best for all students, it was decided that two regional schools would be built, one for Hythe for grades 7-9 and one for Beaverlodge 10-12. This solutions provided higher numbers for both, translating into more funding and staffing for both Core and optional classes and better extra cirricular opportunities. This arrangement has worked very well since, and has been show to be truly a solution that provided the best education for all regional students. The Beaverlodge Elementary school has experienced a drop in enrollment recently, and is presently conduction a campaign to increase student enrollment by removing the Beaverlodge area 7-9 students from Hythe Regional school and placing them in BES and BRHS. At first glance, this appears to be an easy and effective solution, until you begin to look at the immediate effects and potential long term results. Instead of creating a regional community strategy, it looks at only the questionable value to one community to the detriment of all the others involved. Much of this is politically driven and does not consider what is truly the best for ALL students in the west part of the county of Grande Prairie. In fact, there are negative consequences to students at all levels in the regional communities.

Hythe Regional school currently has 206 students enrolled in junior High. Numbers have remained static despite the drop in students coming from Beaverlodge. Thanks to this enrollment, the school offers a wide range of academic programming with specialized teachers and support staff. It also offers a multitude of resources and special activities, including a full sports program. In a 2022 survey, an overwelming majority of the Jr High students in HRS expressed satisfaction with the academic, social, and extra curricular opportunities availabe at that school. Regional Junior High and High school has been an effective and efficient soulution for all of the West Peace Wapiti area for financial, educational, and community population issues. If its not broken, why try to fix it? We need to consider what is best for all children, not making decisions on the basis of divisive political agendas.

Why would you pull students from one PW school to make them have low utilization just to up the utilization in another PW school? With current utilizations being almost identical for BES, HRS & BRHS, why would you not leave it along?

Put the students education first! This scenario is biased and of the opinions of a few people & doesn't take any other school including HRS.

They must consider how this will affect all the students, all the staff and all the money that would need to be spent.

In-person, facilitated conversations with school teachers and staff were held at Beaverlodge Elementary School and Hythe Regional School on February 14 and 15, 2023. At each event, attendees discussed the benefits, drawbacks and considerations for each of the three scenarios under consideration for junior high programming.

February 15, 2023 – Hythe Regional School – 33 attendees

Scenario 1 (Re-alignment: BES K-7 and BRHS 8-12)


Online Survey

An online survey was available from January 24-February 24. We shared three potential scenarios for junior high programming and asked community members to share the benefits, trade-offs and potential impacts of each scenario. Community members were also asked to share their ideas for other ways to configure junior high programming in these communities.

Scenario 1 (Re-alignment: BES K-7 and BRHS 8-12)

Please indicate your level of comfort with this approach.

In the **online survey**, respondents shared their overall comfort level with this scenario for junior high programming. It is important to note that the majority of survey respondents shared that they associate most with Beaverlodge, and also that voices in any engagement process expressing inequity will always be less than a majority. As such, it is important to understand that this quantitative data provides an incomplete story without the added context of participant stories, perspectives and experiences.



What are the benefits of this scenario?

Keeps majority of students off the highway and in third home community

The gym is big enough for several classes to use at one time, there are two fully functional science rooms, a makerspace room, a cooking room, plus so much more. The JrHigh program s successful at HRS. To decimate it would be irresponsible on many levels. Financially, educationally and to our students and communities. Plus, this scenario puts some of our most vulnerable students in a situation to lose more of their innocence by being in a high school setting. Many high school teachers have said they don't believe having JrHigh aged students in a high school setting is wise. They are too immature to manage successfully in this type of environment. Plus, the high school does not have the space for this many more students. The 'facts' being shared are not accurate. This scenario also creates more divisiveness between the communities. There have been long-standing rivalries that were healing and showing signs of reducing. This small group of vocal parents have reignited old hurts in the name of getting a new school for Beaverlodge. They are unwilling to work together for what is best for our children and their futures and are instead focused on what would be best for them in the short term. There is no willingness shown to work together for what is best for the young people in our communities. Demands are made with no regard for what is truly best long term. For

example, losing over \$130 000 per year in bussing grants. This is a huge loss to the entire school district. Or, the amount of money lost to the district in doing upgrades in Beaverlodge which are completely unnecessary. Or, that one small group of vocal people are acting as though they represent all parents in the area. This is misleading, hurtful and damaging to the futures of our students. Especially considering the amount of false information they are sharing. Another drawback is limiting the community building and friendship building between communities. HRS fosters community connections and brings communities together. This has been done successfully for many years. This scenario will segregate communities, limit diversity and the friendships students from different areas build to help them transition to high school. Many young people find the transition to high school difficult. This scenario will exacerbate those difficulties by limiting the connections students have to take with them to a new learning environment with new stresses and pressures. This scenario is likely to negatively impact high school completion rates especially for our most vulnerable/marginalized young people. With reduced resources and funding for JrHigh students in all sites the educational quality will suffer. Specialized teachers will be few to none. EA support will be split or eliminated. Funding for K&E classes and option classes will be reduced to the point of making them unlikely in the way they are currently delivered. For this reason, more families are likely to move their students to St Mary or Grande Prairie. What would be the reason to stay? Would families willingly choose a diluted education for their children when other options are so convenient? If a school has relatively little to offer because resources and funding are being split between sites what are the incentives to draw families to have their children go there? Is a 12 minute bus ride really the issue? Does that justify damaging and possibly destroying a public system that is working well considering the dropping population in Beaverlodge? Plus, this scenario does not consider why BES is losing students. It does not facilitate BES doing any work to address the underlying problems causing families to go elsewhere. What if this scenario does not fix the problem? Then HRS will be decimated, BES will still have issues and PWPSD will lose even more students. This scenario doesn't look at any underlying reasons for BES losing students. It is based on unsubstantiated assumptions that are not proven to be true. It is costly, divisive and will potentially cause more problems for the local communities, their schools and PWPSD. Not to mention the sentiments from the Horse Lake community about scenario one and two promoting the segregation of indigenous people. In a time of Truth and Reconciliation is that truly the best path forward for Peace Wapiti? Or should we be looking at a scenarios that promote diversity, compassion, community building, working together and pooling our resources to offer the best education possible for our smaller, rural communities? If these proposed scenarios do not have the desired outcomes, has anyone considered what to do next? Is there a plan in place for what to do to rebuild all of the destruction inherent in scenario one and two? These scenarios are short-sighted and destructive. They are costly and not in the best interest of our children and their futures. They are not in the best interest of Truth and Reconciliation. They are not in the best interest of staff and their mental health. They are not in the best interest of the mental health of our students and their success. These scenarios are short sighted and destructive to all of the growth our local education system has promoted and worked so hard for over the years. They do not hold BES accountable at all for the reduced numbers they are seeing. The BES school council is not welcoming or willing to work together. They promote what they want at the exclusion of everyone else and at the exclusion of what is best for all of our children. Currently school usage at BRHS, BES and HRS are comparable and healthy. Scenario one and two artificially bump up the numbers at BRHS and BES at the extreme detriment to HRS. There is no consideration in these scenarios regarding how to support HRS. None. Basically these scenarios are flipping BES' problems onto HRS with no regard for the students, staff or communities. How is this justified? These scenarios also promote giving credence to a vocal minority. If this is established as how the PWPSD board operates, where will it end? Will public funds be used to quiet vocal groups who have questionable motives? How is this serving our students in the best possible way? How is it justified to spend so much public money to appease a small group of parents who are rallying everyone they know, in communities that aren't even involved, in a quest that has questionable efficacy? Will school board members be able to justify this and have an effective strategy to

address future vocal minorities who have political agendas, once a precedent has been set? This doesn't even take into account the racial dimension underlying the push by the BES school council. It is so disappointing to consider that in 2023 this is where we are. Scenarios one and two promote division and segregation instead of diversity and community building. This is extremely disturbing on many levels. I could go on and on about the drawbacks of scenarios one and two. So could many of the people who live in these areas. Many are unwilling to get involved in something that has become so hurtful and negative. They are happy with our current education system and don't want it to change. They also don't want to get involved in an ugly situation.

Grade 8 students are too young to be attending a High School. Taking away the Beaverlodge students from the Hythe students is especially detrimental to Hythe students. They would not be left with enough students to have valuable extra curricular sports. Hythe students and Beaverlodge students both would miss out on the opportunity to make new friendships. I have personally seen the positive impacts on many students when Hythe students combine with Beaverlodge students. The benefits go both ways.

Not ideal to have grade 8 students in a high school.

The grade 8 and 9 curriculum would have to be semesters which is not conducive to best practice for children that young. Sports teams in hythe and beaverlodge would be less competitive. Less exposure to diversity. BES is not set up to be a junior high like HRS is. Less opportunities for socialization—many kids do not find peer connections until they get to grade 7 at HRS. PWPSD would lose their transportation for the Beaverlodge to Hythe transfer route, moving teachers to other schools has a huge impact on them and their families, specialized programs would not be available to smaller school populations, to name a few.

Why should a small group of unhappy school council members from BES put this upon the system which has been working well for years and generally turns out well-rounded students? It causes division between the 2 communities, broken friendships and bad feelings, just as it did years ago when this scenario was tried to be implemented.

The safety and wellbeing of our children in Beaverlodge is at risk when you mix 14 and 15 year olds with 18 and 19 year olds. Those two age groups should not have school/sports/youth groups together and I have some life experience to share from when I first met highschoolers when I attended youth group as a jr high student. In 2011 two male BRHS students were looked into on accounts of rape and statutory rape. A 13 year old girl had gone to the Beaverlodge hospital after being raped and gave a statement to police. While investigating the scene another student was compromised for another encounter. The other student (18) was only released because the girl (myself) had recently turned 14 so based on timeliness it was not statutory rape. Although it was not statutory rape, 14 and 18 year olds should not be forming relationships. Now that I am an adult I see the danger. The other male student (16) was able to drop the charges by saying the girl (13) consented by helping him undress her. Gr. 7, 8, and 9 should not be added to any highschool. I will never understand why it is done. Please do not let this come to pass.

Grade 8 with grade 12

Hythe would lose half of their JH population resulting in loss of teachers, loss of school extracurricular (sport teams), loss of programming (K&E, Inclusive Education, etc) and loss of social growth and development for students. The rich variety of option classes would be impossible to offer with reduced staffing resulting from fewer students. Specialized classes such as K&E would be less viable with fewer students, if they are possible at all. Fewer teachers, especially teachers with subject specializations, would reduce the level of instruction for all students. Expecting teachers to teach a variety of subject areas, rather than subject specialties is taxing and makes engaging programming more difficult. Reduced numbers could potentially create split-grade classes which makes achieving curricular objectives much more difficult. Reduced sports team options. Competetive sports teams at any site would be unlikely. Plus, having the trained coaching staff, or teacher supervisors, would be less likely. Without competetive sport skill development at formative ages, the likelihood of playing college or university sports is much less likely, as is the possibility of sports scholarships. Some students would choose to attend other schools in order to access these options. Slashing school usage at HRS to 43% is a terrible waste of infrastructure. HRS is set up to accommodate all regional JrHigh students. Dismantling this would be a huge waste of money. Socialing with students from all communities would be elimiated. The community building that occurs at HRS would be eliminated. Building compassion and acceptance of other cultures during formative years facilitates a smoother transition to high school. It also benefits high school completion. Eliminating this community building harms our students now and in their futures. Our young people will be exposed to many cultures in their lives and having a compassionate, accepting mindset will facilitate better relationships in work environments and in communities. Learning to accept others during formative years is a critical step to thriving in a diverse world. It makes more sense to have Grade 8 students at BES along with Grade 7 students.



It is important to note that the majority of survey respondents shared that they associate most with Beaverlodge, and also that voices in any engagement process expressing inequity will always be less than a majority. As such, it is important to understand that this quantitative data provides an incomplete story without the added context of participant stories, perspectives and experiences.



What are the benefits of this scenario?

It would bring the students back to the public district and give the people of the Beaverlodge community the opportunity to educate their children in their home community K-12. Families are actively choosing the catholic school division in Beaverlodge because they offer JUNIOR HIGH in the town of Beaverlodge. That is the reason why BES enrollment is declining. Families are starting to choose the catholic school right at the kindergarten level.

The other benefits of having BES K-8 are endless. -they can be involved in community events -they can use community facilities (swimming pool, fitness center, cultural center) that are not available in Hythe -participating in extra-curricular activities is much easier, the kids can often just walk home -bussing costs would decrease -less time on the bus is beneficial to any child -junior high students could walk to home ec/shop classes (that take place at the highschool) rather than being bussed back to Beaverlodge from them (again cutting down on bus costs) -no CSW's would be easier for working parents as they wouldn't have to arrange childcare on those Fridays -leadership development and confidence building without the transition to a new school at the age of 12 -remaining involved in their home community during 3 very formative years of their youth -Grade 9 at the high school would allow for Junior Teams for sports As you can tell I am all for my kids staying in Beaverlodge.

Beaverlodge students stay in their own community which I feel is extremely important.

I believe this is the best scenario! I went to a k-8 then 9-12 for high school and it was a good combination for age grouping. The Beaverlodge kids will have much more time and more opportunity and both the public schools will be utilized at a higher capacity, it will also help with the over crowding at the catholic school. This gives our kids more opportunity for employment, sports and other extra curricular activity. It helps the kids and parents for sickness as well (2 working parents and kid is sick) in Beaverlodge kid could walk home if parent isn't available. Also, hospital access. Exactly the same as those in Scenario one except this is additional stress on existing amenities such as gym space and bathrooms. Millions of TAXPAYER dollars were spent on HRS, which just opened in February of 2009. Moving these students would leave HRS less than half full. Students from all communities that currently come together would face a decrease in options and less flexibility in programming. Students from multiple communities (Hythe, Beaverlodge, HLFN, and Kelly Lake) currently develop community relationships aside from those they would experience in their own community, but still have access to those more limited experiences within their own communities. This crucial developmental experience would be lost. Students currently experience constructive intercultural relationships that help to empower them to have empathy and respect for others. These crucial life skills would not be experienced. Students from all these communities would lose the opportunity to know and bond with one another, thus creating a smoother, less stressful transition to High School. HRS usage would drop astronomically which is ridiculous considering the fact that it is basically a new building fully equipped for JrHigh students. The gym is big enough for several classes to use at one time, there are two fully functional science rooms, a makerspace room, a cooking room, plus so much more. The JrHigh program s successful at HRS. To decimate it would be irresponsible on many levels. Financially, educationally and to our students and communities. Plus, this scenario puts some of our most vulnerable students in a situation to lose more of their innocence by being in a high school setting. Many high school teachers have said they don't believe having JrHigh aged students in a high school setting is wise. They are too immature to manage successfully in this type of environment. Plus, the high school does not have the space for this many more students. The 'facts' being shared are not accurate. This scenario also creates more divisiveness between the communities. There have been long-standing rivalries that were healing and showing signs of reducing. This small group of vocal parents have reignited old hurts in the name of getting a new school for Beaverlodge. They are unwilling to work together for what is best for our children and their futures and are instead focused on what would be best for them in the short term. There is no willingness shown to work together for what is best for the young people in our communities. Demands are made with no regard for what is truly best long term. For example, losing over \$130 000 per year in bussing grants. This is a huge loss to the entire school district. Or, the amount of money lost to the district in doing upgrades in Beaverlodge which are completely unnecessary. Or, that one small group of vocal people are acting as though they represent all parents in the area. This is misleading, hurtful and damaging to the futures of our students. Especially considering the amount of false information they are sharing. Another drawback is limiting the community building and friendship building between communities. HRS fosters community connections and brings communities together. This has been done successfully for many years. This scenario will segregate communities, limit diversity and the friendships students from different areas build to help them

transition to high school. Many young people find the transition to high school difficult. This scenario will exacerbate those difficulties by limiting the connections students have to take with them to a new learning environment with new stresses and pressures. This scenario is likely to negatively impact high school completion rates especially for our most vulnerable/marginalized young people. With reduced resources and funding for JrHigh students in all sites the educational quality will suffer. Specialized teachers will be few to none. EA support will be split or eliminated. Funding for K&E classes and option classes will be reduced to the point of making them unlikely in the way they are currently delivered. For this reason, more families are likely to move their students to St Mary or Grande Prairie. What would be the reason to stay? Would families willingly choose a diluted education for their children when other options are so convenient? If a school has relatively little to offer because resources and funding are being split between sites what are the incentives to draw families to have their children go there? Is a 12 minute bus ride really the issue? Does that justify damaging and possibly destroying a public system that is working well considering the dropping population in Beaverlodge? Plus, this scenario does not consider why BES is losing students. It does not facilitate BES doing any work to address the underlying problems causing families to go elsewhere. What if this scenario does not fix the problem? Then HRS will be decimated, BES will still have issues and PWPSD will lose even more students. This scenario doesn't look at any underlying reasons for BES losing students. It is based on unsubstantiated assumptions that are not proven to be true. It is costly, divisive and will potentially cause more problems for the local communities, their schools and PWPSD. Not to mention the sentiments from the Horse Lake community about scenario one and two promoting the segregation of indigenous people. In a time of Truth and Reconciliation is that truly the best path forward for Peace Wapiti? Or should we be looking at a scenarios that promote diversity, compassion, community building, working together and pooling our resources to offer the best education possible for our smaller, rural communities? If these proposed scenarios do not have the desired outcomes, has anyone considered what to do next? Is there a plan in place for what to do to rebuild all of the destruction inherent in scenario one and two? These scenarios are short-sighted and destructive. They are costly and not in the best interest of our children and their futures. They are not in the best interest of Truth and Reconciliation. They are not in the best interest of staff and their mental health. They are not in the best interest of the mental health of our students and their success. These scenarios are short sighted and destructive to all of the growth our local education system has promoted and worked so hard for over the years. They do not hold BES accountable at all for the reduced numbers they are seeing. The BES school council is not welcoming or willing to work together. They promote what they want at the exclusion of everyone else and at the exclusion of what is best for all of our children. Currently school usage at BRHS, BES and HRS are comparable and healthy. Scenario one and two artificially bump up the numbers at BRHS and BES at the extreme detriment to HRS. There is no consideration in these scenarios regarding how to support HRS. None. Basically these scenarios are flipping BES' problems onto HRS with no regard for the students, staff or communities. How is this justified? These scenarios also promote giving credence to a vocal minority. If this is established as how the PWPSD board operates, where will it end? Will public funds be used to quiet vocal groups who have questionable motives? How is this serving our students in the best possible way? How is it justified to spend so much public money to appease a small group of parents who are rallying everyone they know, in communities that aren't even involved, in a quest that has questionable efficacy? Will school board members be able to justify this and have an effective strategy to address future vocal minorities who have political agendas, once a precedent has been set? This doesn't even take into account the racial dimension underlying the push by the BES school council. It is so disappointing to consider that in 2023 this is where we are. Scenarios one and two promote division and segregation instead of diversity and community building. This is extremely disturbing on many levels. I could go on and on about the drawbacks of scenarios one and two. So could many of the people who live in these areas. Many are unwilling to get involved in something that has become so hurtful and negative. They are happy with our current education system and don't want it to change. They also don't want to get involved in an ugly situation.

Utilization of HRS is very low compared to BES in this scenario. HRS was recently renovated to accommodate the educational needs of grades 7-9, the space should be used if it exists. Since the pandemic, students have more complex learning and social-emotional needs. Educating these students together allows us to use our resources more efficiently and to provide specialized programming and services that could not exist in either school because of a smaller student population and a lack of adequate funding. Knowledge and Employability classes would not exist in grades 8 & 9. Having so many junior high teachers allows HRS to have very specialized instructors teaching content that they have a lot of expertise in. Moving these teachers to three different schools could result in them having to teach something that is not in their area, decreasing the quality of education for all students. None of the schools would be able to offer nine different complementary classes. Separating grades 7-9 students into three different schools would create more sports teams, which requires more teachers to volunteer to coach or supervise them. Many of the teams at HRS are coached or supervised by teachers who don't teach grades 7-9. A larger school population also creates a more diverse student population which can encourage students to appreciate different perspectives and have a better understanding and respect for others. Students have a chance to develop more meaningful friendships when they spend their days with a variety of different students. It is so amazing to see that kid who had few friends in elementary meet new people in grade 7 that they can connect with. I am terrified when I think of sending my grade 8 daughter to high school for grade 9 next year. All that she would be robbed of for that final year of junior high, especially after the last few years living through a pandemic and all that she has already lost. I worry that she is not mature enough to attend BRHS and how she will be thrust into a world that will create pressures and problems that 14 year olds should not have to deal with. That concerns me the most. One of the things I have loved about being in a rural area is that our grade 9s are NOT at the high school. Let them be kids for one more year, they deserve that much.

Reduced programming options for all students, especially those at HRS. Splitting resources and funding between three sites would dilute programming options for all students. The rich variety of option classes would be impossible to offer with reduced staffing resulting from fewer students. Specialized classes such as K&E would be less viable with fewer students, if they are possible at all. Fewer teachers, especially teachers with subject specializations, would reduce the level of instruction for all students. Expecting teachers to teach a variety of subject areas, rather than subject specialties is taxing and makes engaging programming more difficult. Reduced numbers could potentially create split-grade classes which makes achieving curricular objectives much more difficult. Reduced sports team options. Competetive sports teams at any site would be unlikely. Plus, having the trained coaching staff, or teacher supervisors, would be less likely. Without competetive sport skill development at formative ages, the likelihood of playing college or university sports is much less likely, as is the possibility of sports scholarships. Some students would choose to attend other schools in order to access these options. Slashing school usage at HRS to 43% is a terrible waste of infrastructure. HRS is set up to accommodate all regional IrHigh students. Dismantling this would be a huge waste of money. Socialing with students from all communities would be elimiated. The community building that occurs at HRS would be eliminated. Building compassion and acceptance of other cultures during formative years facilitates a smoother transition to high school. It also benefits high school completion. Eliminating this community building harms our students now and in their futures. Our young people will be exposed to many cultures in their lives and having a compassionate, accepting mindset will facilitate better relationships in work environments and in communities. Learning to accept others during formative years is a critical step to thriving in a diverse world. With reduced numbers and subsequent reduced funding, special performances, speakers, events, etc would be greatly reduced for all students. A plan like this would hurt HRS deeply. It would also hurt the community of Hythe. Is is justified to damage one school community so terribly when the current system is working very well?



Students have a chance to develop more meaningful friendships when they spend their days with a variety of different students. At that time BES was on the capital plan to have a new K-8 school built because we were at full capacity. Fast forward to 2016 when the NEW catholic school was built in Beaverlodge. Families jumped ship and went to the new catholic school that offered the ONLY junior high option in Beaverlodge. Since then BES enrollment has drastically declined and because of this we are no longer on the capital plan for a new school. Rough number of calculation since 2016 is an approx. loss of \$7,000,000 of funding at BES. Familes are not moving away from the town they are moving to another school district because of the unnecessary busing and no option for Junior High in Beaverlodge. Beaverlodge is the largest community WEST of Grande Prairie to the BC border. We need to be competitive in the Public School district and offer JUNIOR HIGH in Beaverlodge.

This is undeniably difficult to counter/balance and puts Beaverlodge children at an immediate disadvantage. -parents are less engaged due to accessibility and proximity -CSWs will continue and in turn put strain on dual working parent families who will have to find childcare (when our local daycare is already max'ed with 3 year waitlists) -this will continue to be an ongoing issue that will resurface at some point, as history has already shown -the current K&E program/classroom at HRS needs review, as students struggle with the degree of change in programming when they enter high school and if they enter K&E in high school, they will not receive a diploma. HRS claims that this is a beneficial program, but it is not. -BES will likely continue to experience a decline of enrolment as people will choose the Catholic school if it means they can have their children educated in their home community; this will eventually impact HRS.

It is difficult to support the school sports of my child when they go to school in another town than where I live. Ask yourself how far your child lives from the school they attend? Would it seem reasonable that they travel on multiple buses a day over hundreds of kilometres a week to a distant town? Let's go, keep our kids local.

Continued bussing of the majority of students down a dangerous highway. Broken connection with the students community at a young age. Peace Wapiti would continue to lose students to the Catholic School system. The families that have chose to move their children are our friends and family members. Their reason for moving are strictly to utilize the junior high that is in our hometown. My daughter has experienced most of her friends moving to the Catholic school and is struggling with finding her new normal. All students who are bussed will continue to experience increased bussing times to accommodate the transfer to Hythe.

Everything. Change needs to happen now. Not yesterday.

Prefer scenario 2

BES would experience a sharp decline in enrollment and the quality of education at BES. Over time, public education would cease to exist in the town of Beaverlodge at the K-9 level.

This Scenario Negatively effects Beaverlodge Elementary Students.

Beaverlodge kids have to be bussed

Loss of funding to a non inclusive catholic school that is, for some reason, publicly funded. Thus dividing public funding as a whole and causing the education system and our children to suffer

Busing times for students would remain high. Students are leaving their home community and their sense of belonging. They may not have the same level of respect for the spaces and people. They do not have a "safe" place/person to go outside of the school if needed. Some students would not be able to join sports teams if their parents are unable to travel to pick them up after school hours. The continued decrease in enrolment at the Beaverlodge Elementary school due to the lack of a junior high option within the public board. This has already resulted in a decrease in teaching/support staff and detrimental classroom configurations having to be utilized (ie, multiple teachers for 1 single class, combining two classes for a period of the day making for a large class size)

Beaverlodge parents don't have enough control of what is going on with their young children

Beaverlodge students continue to be bused up the highway....a situation that puts them in unnecessary danger

Current trends show parents flocking to St.Mary's catholic school to avoid busing students to another community. Resulting in the public school losing funding due to a decline in attendance/enrollment. I am a full time single working parent and having my child in another community will be very challenging for me. My child will be impacted by possibly not being able to participate in extra curricular. She will be bused on a busy highway with a history of accidents of Peace Wapiti Busses. He education continuity, mental health and confidence will be impacted by uprooting her to a new community. The current situation is me questioning sending her to the catholic school. I don't want to but prefer my child in the community I live and work in. I want my child in close proximity to a hospital. I want her to have access to more facilities (eg.swimming lessons) and feel like Hythe cannot offer that. If they did they would be busing my child more on a busy highway. It just doesn't make sense and I haven't heard of a larger community busing kids to a smaller community. I feel like Hythe can keep their students in Hythe and Beaverlodge keep their students in their community.

Three bus loads of students will continue to travel a busy two lane high way twice daily. When the initial arrangement to do this was made about 50 years ago, the traffic on this high way looks a lot different than it does today. When I travelled to Hythe yesterday, I met 51 vehicles and 21 of those were semi trucks. My concern is for the safety of the students.

Our junior high students will continue to be put at risk by being transported.

Kids still have to travel to school outside of their hometown on bad roads

K-9 within the elementary school Adding portables to accommodate Junior kindergarten should not be prioritized over grade 9 education- this is an extra program that is not required therefore should be questioned over displacing the grade 9's- with portables they really should be able to achieve all. Using school spaces in new waysfor example, libraries/music rooms are commonly now referred to as "flex spaces" allowing more classrooms to fit. With proper reconfiguration and expectations of movement within the school, they can make room for more opportunities.

Friendships are formed early in life (students that joined together in grade 10 from other schools were the outcasts as they hadn't formed those connections early on). It will never be officially stated but many Beaverlodge parents have issues with Horselake First Nations attending school with their children. They have also stated the bus ride is unsafe but apparently it is safe for Hythe to travel to Beaverlodge? They want to cram extra students into an old dilapidated school with the hopes of getting a new school and the hopes of protecting their children from the outside world. It would be nice to see both communities to work together for the kids interests and not their personal mandates. I was a trustee on the PWSD the school board for 10 years. This has never been a Beaverlodge versus Hythe scenario. Every time vehicles are on the road there is a risk. Beaverlodge is the largest municipality in the province of Alberta without its on public junior high school outside of the Catholic division. Over 40 years ago a decision was made to move the Beaverlodge junior high students to Hythe during the construction of the Beaverlodge high school. This was to be a temporary fix until Beaverlodge built their own standalone 7 to 9 school. Over the years stories, I've been told that have missed lead school boards, school trustees, an executive of the school division. This has never been more true, than today. This is not a political stand. This is more of a jealousy stand towards you have this you have that? The funding model that the provincial government set out for the school divisions needs to be looked at for this to take place. I am out of town for these three meeting but if there is somewhere, I can present to the group of individuals that are considering any one of the three scenarios I would love to be able to speak directly to them.

Current rates of students leaving public for the Catholic school will continue to increase if this isn't changed

The demographics if Hythe loses the Beaverlodge students will change. That could be to advantage as more specialized programming could potentially become an option. It could also lead to greater segregation in high school for the children as they mix at that time.

The plan was already created, the junior high was created in Hythe, it's a junior high. Why take it away. It works for the kids, it's made for the kids so leave it as is.

If the enrollment of kids in Jr High is reducing in Beaverlodge, why is there a push to make their class size smaller and hurt both Beaverlodge and Hythe Kids? This is the age where kids get to start options, to see what they want to be. The more kids in this group the better. Moving the Jr High to Beaverlodge to keep them together harms Hythe by making them commute for 3 more years. The current arrangement balances out the travel for both groups. Keeping in mind the Hythe catchment area includes Demmit and Horse Lake, and Beaverlodge includes farms close to it. it is not just the 15 minute bus ride to be considered. BES is struggling because a new school was built in their community and the BES staff is known to follow traditional and inflexible teaching practices, both factors are causing parents to move their children. My child currently attends BES. I am a Beaverlodge resident and I look forward to the opportunities that HRS can offer my child. If there is a change to the current junior high situation, I will be enrolling my child and their younger siblings in St. Mary.

As with many years ago when this same idea was tossed around and when the previous school board wasted years of trying to get a new 7-9 school built in Beaverlodge, This doesn't feel like it is about keeping kids schooled in their own community. If that were the case the group should also be fighting hard to keep kids in Wembley, high school kids in Hythe or all kids to be educated in Horselake. This feels more like a certain faction of BL parents do not want their kids being in the same school as kids from Horselake. The conversations at the stores, at the arenas etc. is killing relationships and creating hostility- if a change is determined then make it immediate

If we remove our Beaverlodge students from HRS I believe both groups of Jrhigh students will be robbed of opportunities. To make friends, experience a new culture at school (jr high is a big change for hythe students because they are the minority in the school) that integration of our communities is very important at the ages of 12-15 when our children are really starting to understand the world around them, relationships, communication, what's right/wrong/fair.

Yes - consider the damage that this kind of change would do to Hythe Regional. I am shocked and disturbed that the entire focus of this study is on Beaverlodge and how a change would benefit that community. There are many communities involved and ultimately the quality of programming needs to be the number one concern. Bussing has not been an issue and should not be considered a talking point in this discussion as all students are bussed at one point or another. It is unreasonable to say it is "dangerous" for one group and then tell the other 4 or 5 communities to hop on the bus to go to BRHS. The populations in rural alberta fluctuate and BES may see growth with that population as it has recently seen a decline, which is inline with the population. While some parents are opting for

Catholic schools BES should do more investigating into why students are leaving - there might be more to it then "bussing" since I'm sure the kids who have transferred do not all walk to school. Consider funding for education in the upcoming election - which parties prioritizing funding for schools - an increase in funding can help with staffing to alleviate oversized classes, this may be a solution to some of the issues BES is facing rather than devastating a partner schools population.

This has always been an issue. However what Beaverlodge seems to forget, they are not special. Kids need to bus either from Hythe or Beaverlodge and every parent and child needs to be aware if this. Working between the two places should be a non start issue. I went to school in both Hythe and Beaverlodge, and I got to make good long lasting friendships. 

If the staff you do have are passionate and trying new ways to teach, and the school offers some really neat programming that will actually teach them skills they need for their future then that's all that matters. Every time I had to switch to a new school it was a little scary but also felt like a new start too. School is something that every child has to do to grow up and be successful. Having a change sometimes is a good thing.

Consider the population, the infrastructure of beaverlodge, the access of Beaverlodge and the robust economy and growth of Beaverlodge. Our public school is dying and resulting in a SPIKE in growth of the Catholic school. Our programming and funding in Beaverlodge is suffering as a result

Peace Wapiti needs to stay competitive by offering junior high education in Beaverlodge. A vast majority of the student population that has been lost is families choosing the Catholic School system for the simple fact that they do offer junior high in Beaverlodge. I am a strong believer that by Peace Wapiti offering junior high, they would overcome this obstacle of losing students.





UNNECESSARY BUSSING TO ANOTHER COMMUNITY IS DANGEROUS AND COSTLY. KEEP KIDS IN THEIR HOMETOWN. STABILITY IS IMPORTANT!

Busing students down a busy two lane high way does not make sense when there is room in the school in Beaverlodge

Busing three bus loads of students down a busy high way twice daily, when there is room in the community's schools, does not make sense.

BES teachers are amazing and have always created a flourishing school environment for my children. I would love to keep then at BES

Beaverlodge deserves a Junior High the same as Elmworth, La Glacé, Hythe, Wembley, And every other place in Peace Wapiti.

The traffic on the single lane highway to Hythe is increasing each year, which makes me nervous to send my kids on the bus to/from Hythe.

100 students being moved to the Catholic system to avoid bussing speaks volumes about what is wanted by Beaverlodge citizens

Beaverlodge is the largest community west of GP. We should be able to educate our children in our community. They are OUR children.

I have many friends who have moved their children to St Mary school simply to avoid bussing.

SCENARIO 2: BES K-8 and BRHS 9-12, HRS remains K-9

I have had nothing but a great experience for my kids at HRS. The teachers care, they try, they are good at what the do. Don't change it.

Larger junior high school student numbers allows for teachers to be subject specialists

When I went to Junior High in Hythe many of my friends were cut from volleyball and basketball teams.

Keeping our children in Beaverlodge for all of their lives would not help prepare them for life after high school.

Keep BES as K-6 and Hythe K-9.

Larger junior high school numbers allow for more extra-curricular activities

6-7 busses travel to BRHS as it is proven that regional schools allow for more academic choices for all students. This is same at jr high.

If BES has lost 100 kids, they should look for ways to make their own school more attractive to families(intramurals, open their doors, etc)

Beaverlodge has the regional high school. Why is it fair for them to have junior high as well?

Bussing is an excuse... unsafe highways are an excuse. People drive that highway all the time for less important reasons then school.

There is no room for growth in Beaverlodge. Maybe parents are sending kids to st Mary's because they prefer the religious teaching.

Maybe Beaverlodge should bus their kids to Elmworth. It could be a regional school and that hi-way is safer and less busy.
